Absolute, complete, sometimes overwhelming dedication to Swansea-Belmont Surf Life Saving Club. Club Captain – 1962-68; President – 1969-74, Australian Premiership-winning R&R Coach, 1972 Australian

Championship R&R Coach, prominent contributor to every major event held on Blacksmiths Beach, sports secretary, standard-bearer, age supervisor, clubhouse renovator, social organiser – and that list merely identifies part of Cliff's club involvement. Newcastle Branch (more recently, Hunter Branch) President, representative team member, coach and selector, Board of Examiner Zone Supervisor. NSW Representative Team Coach 1973; member of the Australian Representative Team to World Championships held in South Africa, 1973-74, where he was a gold medallist as a member of the boat crew.

Coach of the Australian Rep Team to USA in 1981, and Manager of Australian delegations to World Congresses; California, USA in 1978 and Vancouver, Canada in 1986.

Long-serving National Council Publicity Officer.

Organiser of NSW Congresses in 1975 and 1977

Member of World Championship Organising Committees, Bali – 1981 and Hawaii – 1983.

KEN MURRAY

Whether it's on the beach, or at a pub or club, or around the dinner table, when the conversation turns to the true greats of the sport of surf boat rowing – and indeed surf life saving – there will always be one name at the very top of the list – Ken "Boofa" Murray, without any

doubt one of the most successful surf boat competitors since surf boat rowing became a sport.

Ken gained his bronze medallion on 19th Nov, 1950, Instructors Certificate in 1964 and Examiners Certificate 1966. He has been inducted into the Australian Sporting Hall of Fame, the NSW Sporting Hall of Champions, the Hunter Region Sporting Hall of Fame and the Australian Surfboat Rowers League Hall of Fame. Ken is the recipient of the International Lifesaving Federation Citation of Merit, the Australian Sports Medal and was selected in the Hunter Branch Team of the Century award. Ken has been selected in six Australian teams, touring to, amongst others destinations, South Africa and Europe, many times as team captain or vice captain. He has represented in ten Hunter Branch Teams.

His remarkable surf boat competition record is.

46 Hunter Branch Gold Medals; 10 NSW State Titles, 4 Silver and 9 Bronze; 9 Australian Gold, 6 Silver and 6 Bronze; and one World Championship Gold. During his career Ken contested 31 Australian Championship finals.

He is recognised as one of the most successful sweeps in the country, however he also won gold as a rower at the Australian titles as a junior in 1950, and a silver at the NSW state titles the same year.

It is acknowledged that Ken Murray has won more Open National Gold medals than any other surf boat athlete.

Brian Summers joined Swansea-Belmont SLSC in 1966, gaining his SBM in that year. He was an excellent patrol member and patrol captain with over a decade of service before attaining Active Reserve status. He was a member of the Year in the 1966/67 season

Brian served on the Management Committee from 1967/68 to '74/75 as Social Secretary, Publicity Officer and Committeeman, as well as Delegate to the Branch in '70/71 and '74/75. He was part of the very successful Pool Survival team in 1976 and '77. As a competitor Brian was a valuable member of our surf boat section, rowing for many years with Branch Championship success.

Brian became Junior Activities Chairman in 1988/89, a position he held for three seasons. This was a period that required strong leadership, with rapid expansion and integration with the senior body, hence a very successful period for our Juniors.

Brian was Manager of the Branch Representative Team in 1996/97. He helped coach representative teams in various competition disciplines on many occasions and helped a wide range of competitors with their preparation prior to competition, and injury recovery afterwards. Brian was also a hard-working member of our workforce for many Australian and NSW Championship carnivals. For his outstanding service to the Club, Brian 'Pom' Summers was elevated to Life Membership.

President's Report

It is with immense pleasure that I present my 8th Annual Report for the 2021/2022 surf season on behalf of Swansea Belmont SLSC. I must thank our Club Directors & Management team for their dedicated voluntary hours throughout the season, once again we managed to comply with health regulations ensuring our members and guest were safe when attending the club. Thanks to your Board the right decisions were made during those times & still are today to ensure all members & local community are in a safe environment. The positive direction in Patrols, Training and Education, Competition, Finance and Administration will ensure we have set the club up for future sustainable success in Surf Life Saving and support of the local community. If you put your hand up to help around the club this past season – I thank you from the bottom of my heart.

The club executive continued our path supporting reconciliation by holding our first smoking ceremony on the first day of Nippers Sunday 7th November 2021 including the official launch of our club swimwear.

"Swansea Belmont SLSC's vision is to be a diverse and inclusive club. As part of our ongoing commitment to our reconciliation journey we have put in place strategies to strengthen diversity within our membership and promote a better understanding of Indigenous Culture. We connected with local artist Thomas Croft -"Crofty's Art" and he created a story piece "Shifting Sands" and allowed us to then showcase his original artwork on our club swimwear. The story behind the swimwear gives us insight of the First Nations peoples connection to the land. "

Another long season on the sand patrolling our pristine beach as an Emergency Service with no loss of life whilst the flags were flying and I commend our dedicated volunteer patrol members for your efforts working alongside LMCC Lifeguards ensuring our community and visitors went home safe to their loved ones. We are one lucky club to have great members giving up their family time to train and educate our award members giving them the essential life skills to wear the red and yellow patrol outfit. Thank you to all trainers & assessors. We had 418 new awards this season. Awards achieved by our members were 351 Junior Surf Ed, 23 Surf Rescue, 28 Bronze Medallion, 2 Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue, 2 IRB Driver, 32 First Aid, 2 IRB Crew, 2 RWC & 8 Silver Medallion Beach Management.

Another stellar championship was achieved with many medals, finalist and new Green Jacket recipients inducted for their Gold Medals. Very proud to see how the athletes not only competed but held their heads high when then result desired did not go their way, this gift is embedded into the athletes at all training sessions under the tutelage of the club coaching staff who volunteer their time and experience. Well done to our competitors who went onto represent at higher levels.

As stated earlier the 4 southern surf clubs are still working with LMCC to finalise a new 20year Lease, we have recently declined the Councils latest proposal. Both Chad Griffith and I have been involved with numerous meetings and emails to get the best possible outcome financially and with maintenance schedules for the future. As stated last year until this is resolved it will continue to hold up the club's major building plans.

- Commencement of work for new Kiosk under DA approval Pushed out 2023/24.
- New DA Plans are waiting to be lodged to complete major renovations to the Internal & External building which include a new entrance into the club on southern side, extend Auditorium out onto the front deck with Bi-fold windows, external facade modifications, 3-way bar area to service all function areas upstairs, new entry to downstairs bar, possibly move Radio Room up to a 3rd Level to open up the Auditorium with a view to the South – Pushed out 2023/24.
- New Nipper Room & BBQ Building under DA approval Pushed out Winter 2023.
- Upgrade & Disabled ramp to downstairs Disabled Toilet & Gym entrance Grant \$58K received currently under construction and to be completed in July 2022.

He was our long-term coach of the successful R&R teams along with surf skills to all our club swimmers. Cliff represented at all levels including the 1974 Australian team and then coached the 1984 Australian team. Ken Murray (1994), Hunter Branch (1977), SLS NSW (1992), SLS Australia (1998), Hunter, NSW and National Hall of Fame, Ken is regarded as the most successful Boat Rower and Sweep in SLS history. Summers (2011) served on the club Management Committee and Junior Activities Chairman.

Another long season has passed, and I must thank Katrina for the workload she takes on as Secretary ensuring all SLS Governance is adhered to along with all members needs and requests. It is a mammoth amount of time and effort taken away from her family and on behalf of all members we say thanks. Treasurer's Report

The following three pages set out the financial performance of Swansea Belmont SLSC for the year ended 30 April 2022 and the financial position as at 30 April 2022. These pages were prepared prior the finalisation of the annual audit but are unlikely to change in any material way.

Operating Results

The year was financially another very good year for the club, reporting an Operating Profit Before Depreciation of \$75k. This is however \$120K below the surplus reported in the prior year, largely due to:

• The club did not hold the NSW state titles the year - \$51k

• There was less Bar and Function Income largely due to COVID restrictions - \$25k • The club is no longer paid for maintaining the breakwall - \$20k

• The club increased its expenditure on Lifesaving & Competition - \$30k

A more detailed breakdown of the results and variances from the prior year is shown in the following Income Statement.

Capital Expenditure

The club incurred capital expenditure of \$38k during the year comprising a new flagpole, clubhouse furniture and a ski trailer. These payments are not included in the Operating Profit.

Financial Position

At the end of the year the club had Net Assets of \$3,408k, mostly comprising:

- Property, Plant & Equipment (mostly clubhouse) \$2,522k
- Cash and term deposits \$389k
- Investment Reserves \$484k

Investment Reserves

It was agreed at the 2021 AM that the club should invest up to \$500K in Exchange Traded Funds (EFT's) with a view to increasing the return on accumulated funds over the medium to long term. These funds were invested in a diversified portfolio of ETF's in the knowledge that although over time there should be increased profitability the club could expect to incur losses one year in five.

The club began investing in November 2021 as existing term deposits matured and had invested the full amount by March 2022. In that short period the club earned dividends of \$8,427 but due largely due to the war in Ukraine incurred unrealised losses on its investments of \$13,610 and brokerage fees of \$1,403. These results are included in the Operating Results shown above,

Full details are shown in the following pages.

It was also agreed at the 2021 AGM that any transfer of funds to or from the Reserve should only occur after a vote at a General Meeting of members. Apart from the transfer of 18

dividends (less brokerage fees) the Directors do not propose any transfer of funds at this stage.

In reviewing our membership levels in support of patrols, it is evident we need to work towards recruiting and encouraging more members to support our teams. In addition, this season we continued to develop potential leaders in some of the larger patrols to the stage we can now start moving members onto their own new patrols and create new friendships and broaden the skill base of our patrols, this should also include strengthening of other

patrols that have suffered a reduction in members over the season.

The post season patrol survey will be released to members moving into the 2022 -2023 season - a great head start for planning next season. Our club still remains at the leading edge of training equipment technology and delivery of education in Surf skills and knowledge. I encourage all members to promote the benefits of being an active member in the surf life-saving movement, the skills, knowledge and leadership gained in the service of our community bode well on any



resume to a potential employer. The patrol van had a small upgrade this season, however we strive to design a well-equipped van that serves our patrolling duties.

Our Training group sizes were again limited and for a second year on a row, our usual pre-season recruitment drive for new patrolling members were restricted to our competitive candidates who required their Bronze Medallion and Surf Rescue certificates to compete. We began training about 6 weeks later than usual, and once again, we had to adapt to the checking in, social distancing and constant cleaning rules.

We were able to run a second Bronze Medallion course in November, and from there, we had many of our fabulous members who stepped up to train in new awards for the 2021/2022 season. Our award numbers were increased from the previous year and had 68 new awards for the season. Interestingly, 52% of these members were receiving surf life-saving awards for the very first time. 9 of these Swansea Belmont members are not competing and simply training so they can volunteer as patrolling lifesavers and parent



helpers at Nippers.

All our trainers are continually working on ways to improve our delivery of courses that we run at Swansea Belmont. We will plan to met for a post season wrap up to plan and discuss our training schedule for next 2022/23 season. So, we will keep you all posted on what's install.

E-online learning will continue, and we feel that this year, we have had a record number of members embracing this new way of learning

Social Secretary's Report



Boat Captain's Report

Another season over and a look back on achievements, setbacks and what to look forward to in the coming 2022 / 2023 season.

Achievements

From having zero crews at the time of the A.G.M. and my election as boat captain, things really started to happen quite quickly.

Mitchell Reese had contacted me previously and asked if there was a place for him at the club. I assured him he was most welcome along with his father if he was available. Both of them decided their futures were going to be with Swansea Belmont even if we didn't have any crews at this stage. Both Mitchell and Mick Reese had been members of Swansea Belmont previously, Mitchell as a rower and Mick as a sweep.

A bit of background on Mitchell which the majority of the club will not be aware of. As a rower he has been a part of the crew that won the Hunter and Central Coast Boat Series, The Battle of The Boats, the Manly Carnival, State Gold and Australian Silver in under 23 division with me when I was at Dixon Park. He came back with me to Swansea Belmont and rowed open for a season but that crew collapsed. He had been trying to get into sweeping since giving up rowing. First, he tried at Swansea Belmont but was told by previous Boat Captain there was no nothing for him here. He then went to Redhead but was given limited opportunity there. He has all the required competences of SLSA for sweeping. Everyone has to acquire experience to excel in everything we do and that is where Mitchell is now. He is learning and my personal opinion is that he is going to be a very good sweep.

Mick Reese has been in surf boats for decades and has achieved what most people in surf boats only dream of. He started rowing at Merewether and then went to Dixon Park for a period of time where he won State Gold in the Open Division before returning to Merewether to sweep where he again won numerous State and Australian Medals in all divisions with multiple crews. Mick is a former Boat Captain at Merewether and Newcastle and also is a life member of Merewether.

After my election as Boat Captain Mitchell, Mick and myself went through all the gear we had at the boat shed. There was a mixture of round rowlock oars and square rowlock oars at the shed. Boat pumps weren't working, trailer lights not working and we didn't know what the batteries were like. The oars have now been inspected and all of the serviceable oars have been or are in the process of being converted to square backs and made into individual sets for both training and for competition. The trailers have all been repaired and the pumps in all boats are now working all thanks to Mick. I can't thank him enough for all he has done.

Another person I must thank here is Katrina as she also contributed immensely to the rebuilding of the boat section. This lady did an awesome job recruiting rowers to the boat section and is still recruiting crews for next season. At the start of the season, we needed to buy some equipment and have some things modified and repaired to get us away and a simple e-mail to her and Leanne outlining what was required and why needed, and approval was given. I also want to thank Leanne for all her help with competition entrees.

The crews we had for the season past were under 19 Girls, under 23 Girls, Reserve Men's, Master Women's and we were trying to get a full Masters Men's Crew happening. Had three men but struggling to get the fourth.

Setbacks

Like every other section, Covid was our main disrupter especially with the under 19 and under 23 girls. We had occasions where we were able to field an under 23 girls' crew by having a fill-in or two from the under 19's but not able to go the other way with the under 19's. Covid had us withdrawing from all but two carnivals in what was a short season anyway.

The master's women's crew was looking very promising and I had hopes for them doing well. They are all very competent rowers with a wealth of experience but, again here we had the setback of, the stroke for the crew, Bethany Taylor injuring the tendon on the heal of her foot. She managed to get back into the boat by the end of February but too late to compete.

The reserve men's crew had some rows and handled the poor conditions capably. I give Mitchell full marks here for the recruitment of rowers he has done. The crew was a mixture of, at the carnivals attended, reserves, masters, junior and under 23 guys.

Looking Forward

At this time, we look like keeping all of the under 19 and 23 girls that finished the season and there are some other girls wanting to have a go as well. The possibility of two under 23 girls' crews and a junior girls crew

could likely happen.

We have some new guys wanting to try rowing in the juniors and are hopeful of fielding a crew here.

We are looking for more men to fill crews be it open juniors or reserves.

The Master's men's crew looks like being filled as well but nothing is certain.

The Master's women have all committed for next season.

We are looking for men and women

in all divisions so if you are the least bit interested, please contact us.

Beach Captian's Report

The 2021/2022 season was another successful one for our beach team. Our U9-12 competitors managed to compete at the NSW State Titles before its cancellation. Grace Mueller had a gutsy run in the U12 1km Beach Run finishing in 6th place in a big field and in terrible conditions. Mitchell Chalmers followed claiming the silver medal in the U12 1km Beach Run after falling at the start and running his way through the entire field to get beaten on the line.

With the introduction of the Youth Aussie Titles our small beach team of four brought home an Aussie gold and silver medal and a number of top 10 performances. Our U14 girls, Phoebe Doran and Emerson Leadbeatter deserve a special mention after competing in every beach event on offer, this is not a common thing for beachies, most competitive beach sprinters and flaggers do not have the range to compete in the distance events. But our girls made every final and became the Australian Champions in the U14/15 2x1km Beach Relay. Pheobe won the silver medal in the U14 Beach Sprint with a flawless final race. It should also be acknowledged that Swansea Belmont was the only club to have two competitors in the sprint final with Emerson finishing 8th. The girls backed up for flags against a big field of 75 competitors, the rounds went on for a nerve-racking 90mins. Emerson finished in an excellent and agonising 4th place and Phoebe in 11th.

In the biggest fields ever seen in the beach run races, we had great results in the individual events with Harry Hall finishing 10th in the U13 2km followed by Nate Ward finishing 7th in a very competitive U14 2km. As with the water events, the long-distance beach events are now attracting very competitive track and cross country runners from around Australia, making the fields strong and racing next level, this is fantastic to see and encouraging for our sport.

It was great to see our master's hitting the soft sand in the beach run events, Susie Doran had a fabulous Aussie debut finishing 6th in the 50-54 years 2km with husband Paul Doran placing 9th in 55-59 years. Coming out of 5 years of racing retirement, I managed to win the gold in the 45-49 years 2km and place 5th in the Open Women's 2km.

Tye Worell & Ty Leadbeatter continued their dominance in the U17 2x1km Beach Relay convincedly winning the Australian Title for the second year in a row. They backed up ten minutes later to take on the open men finishing in 9th place. Poppy Doran competed strongly in the U17 Beach Sprint and Flags narrowly missing both finals, she proved hard to beat strongly leading out our mixed relay team round after round.

A big highlight of Aussies was the twilight beach arena, it was great to see so many competitors and supporters come down to the track and support our relay teams. We had three sprint relay teams competing and all three teams made the final. A massive effort for a club that does not have a big beach team with multiply athletes available for selection. A big thank you to all the water competitors (Liam, Katy, Daisy & Kaylee) who put their hand up and ran, I think it was obvious that everyone had a great time and I'm always looking for keen relay runners.

I am on the lookout for a specialist sprint and flags coach to further develop the natural talent shown by many of our nippers in the flags and sprint events. This is an area of the
